





MUSIC NOTES

"Puriri Mass" (2013) was intended to be more a missa brevis (short mass) with a lighter mood overall, although it does include all the words of the ordinary of the mass.

Something typically New Zealand was sought and having a Latin text meant that this depended on the music itself.

The *Kyrie* features birdlike (tui-like) lines in imitation and this is principally what gave the name to the piece. The Puriri tree is also an enduring element of New Zealand's landscape with a most pleasing canopy and shade of green.

The contemplative nature of the *Kyrie* gives way to more energy in the *Gloria* and a bolder key of C major.

The *Credo* uses a Haydn technique of submitting multiple lines of text to different parts i.e. soprano, alto, etc. in order to get it through faster. The opening cantus firmus is expanded into a flourishing and forte conclusion.

The Sanctus has alternating sections and a soprano soloist declaiming Hosanna in excelsis in an exchange with the choir.

The *Benedictus* is more subdued and legato with its own different exultant *Hosanna* episode.

Finally a soprano introduces the *Agnus Dei* and a peaceful conclusion to the mass in the original key of G major.

Completed in 1990 (and revised in 1991) for the RIAS Chamber Choir in Berlin, The Beatitudes is one of the first works in which Arvo Pärt uses the English language. Pärt writes, "Due to the language, the length of the words results in a recital style; however, an original way has been found to transfer the meaning of the text. Each clause between punctuation marks is performed in a different harmonic key. At the same time, the chord sequences are subject to a specific rule. In the course of the composition, the central pitch of the recitation constantly rises, increasing the tension. Having reached its peak, the process reverses after the organ cadenza, and all performed harmonic combinations are repeated, this time in reverse order, moving back to the starting point."

Monteverdi's Beatus vir is one of the few sacred works of his later years that has become widely known. The musical setting is constructed in three sections: A (verses 1 to 4), B (verses 5 to 8), A1 (verse 9) plus the Gloria Patri. The two A sections are set over a 'walking' bass using recurring patterns of notes, and Monteverdi also repeats the opening phrase as a refrain. In the second A section he produces particularly vivid musical images of the wicked man, his desires thwarted, gnashing his teeth in angry envy of the (admittedly rather smug) righteous and blessed man. In the B section of the setting, perhaps prompted by the initial image of happiness, Monteverdi changes to triple time and a new set of recurring bass patterns.
